The 2019 Hidden Meadows Community Foundation Fundraising campaign raised \$15,500 from a total of 203 donors. This represents 12.5% of the nearly 1,600 Hidden Meadows homes. The annual fundraiser is the only source of funds for all of our community activities – the Easter Egg Hunt, Seller's Faire, 4th of July Parade, etc.

Approval of Community Events: What You Don't Know Can Hurt You!

By now, many of you know that our Independence Day BBQ and Parade was reduced to just a parade. The BBQ portion was cancelled with short notice, and we were all encouraged to bring a picnic lunch or eat at the Deli, Market or Tavern.

In late June, our Sellers' Faire Committee was notified that serving or selling food required health department permits from the County of San Diego, with little additional information.

The committee tried to research what was required, but found the process was much more complex than explained and brought the issue to the Foundation Board. We attempted to rapidly research what was needed for a "food permit" for the Sellers' Faire, and found that the available information was clear as mud. We also discovered that it might also apply to the BBQ and parade, just several days away. Further, we found that it wasn't easy to comply with the requirements to apply for this food permit. Lacking a clear understanding of how to comply, and with only a few days left, the decision was made to cancel the BBQ. A huge thank you is owed both the the Independence Day team for their flexibility, understanding and for putting on an absolutely fantastic event, despite these challenges, and to the publishers of the HM News for their quick response and turnaround, and some good advice.

You know that cupboard or closet that you hate to open for just one thing, because you can't control what comes tumbling out behind it?

Research for one permit led to research for other permits. Turns out, the County has a substantial num-

ber of laws directed specifically towards nonprofit organizations and their events, and has a Community Event Permitting Department because, yes, you've guessed it, Public Events require their own permits, food, or no. While these requirements are geared towards organizations whose events require road closures or sheriff support or crowd control or lots of public restrooms for hundreds or thousands of people, the bottom line is that they apply equally to our little foundation in our sleepy little community, IF the public is allowed to attend. The Sellers' Faire is unquestionably this type of event which is open to the public and therefore, must comply.

After many phone calls with the County and our Insurance company, and tremendous support from Mr. Kim and his team at the golf club, I am pleased to report that the Sellers' Faire has the proper documentation and permit required to continue to operate through November, but food products are still not permitted. Very few of our vendors have the required health department permit at this time. Many, I suspect, will find the cost and administrative burden are simply not worthwhile.

The language in the requirements is unfortunately vague and has caused more questions than it's answered, in some cases. Worse, the administrative burden this permitting process places on a few dedicated volunteers who do a wonderful job coordinating the Faire may prove to be an insurmountable burden for them too. I've left that determination up to them.

For now, they've volunteered to work with the food vendors in the "off season" and see if the health department food

permit process is a viable option for everyone involved.

Along the way, you will see some changes to all of our community events. Most affected, of course, is the Sellers' Faire, because it's open to the public: First, the number of months we hold the Faire may be reduced. Watch the Hidden Meadows News for the 2020 schedule. Also gone are the days of "let's have this theme next month", because there may be a separate permit required for something new or at least the determination by the county that one is not required (classic car show, anyone?), which takes approximately 30 days. Too, you'll see a staffed "safety booth/table", which is also a requirement. Thanks to the Fire Safe Council folks for helping to staff that last month. Obviously, more changes could come, if requirements

Our community holiday celebration events may look and feel a little different going forward as well. These holiday events are sponsored by the Foundation for the benefit of only our residents here in Hidden Meadows, and are not open to the general public. We are working on a process now to verify that only you, our invited residents attend these events, and that we can demonstrate that, if asked. We'll take each holiday as it comes and ensure our festivities either do not require a permit, or that we can comply for anything that does.

Our community events are what help to make Hidden Meadows such a special place and some of why we all love living here. Your Foundation volunteers are working hard to ensure we can keep it that way!

Hidden Meadows Summer Movie Nights continued again, for the 4th consecutive year!

To cross the Danube, a large suspension bridge – the Chain Bridge – was constructed in 1849.

On the river, the riverboat berths are set up for one boat at a time, so to take the bus to go into the city we walked across 2 ships' lobbies because the ships are stacked out into the river next to each other.

In Buda, on the western bank of the Danube, we saw Castle Hill, encircled by ramparts that protect the massive castle complex. It was destroyed during World War II, but has been restored, approximating its previous splendor, and it is now a vast museum complex. Later, we saw Heroes' Square, with its Millennial Column set off by equestrian statues of historic 9th-century Magyar conquerors. The adjoining colonnade displays more statues of kings, dukes of Transylvania, and liberty fighters who influenced the history of Hungary.

We viewed the Church of Our Lady, or Mattias Church with its gilded roof, raven on top, and a black structure that points to heaven. The Church was formerly used for the coronations of Hungarian kings. The structure is an interesting mix of architectural styles used during reconstruction of the building at different times in its history.

We viewed the Parliament Building, the Gellert Hill – for a great view of city, and Vaci Utca – a shopping street central market for souvenirs, Union Square, Fisherman's Wharf and a Synagogue that looks like a Catholic Church.

Tonight we enjoyed the Captain's Welcome Dinner. I was surprised that most people were not that dressed up for the dinner. It used to be quite an elegant affair. Not anymore, people were dressed very casually – some with jeans and a top and even saw a few men with the bermudas they wore all day. Ugh! We then went to enjoy a scenic cruise.

Today. sunny, 78 degrees, great day to tour the Hospital in the Rock. The hospital is an underground labyrinth, which was used in WWII and in 1956, during the Hungarian Revolution, to treat the sick and wounded. It is connected to underground caves below Castle Hill in Buda. It was converted into a nuclear fallout shelter during the Cold War. Today, it is a museum, with wax figures in period clothing and vintage medical equipment giving visitors a feel for the intensity of the work performed here.

Back at the ship, cruising towards Bratislava. We cannot sail, they closed the channels in the river due to a boat accident – a Viking cruise ship hit a small boat full of Korean travelers, the little boat turned over and sank in 7 seconds with 21 people inside. They are trying to locate the boat and do rescue operations, and a large crane that's sitting in the middle of the river was bought in to dig the boat out of the river. We have to wait until they tell the captain to go, meanwhile, we had a fire drill and then a lecture on what it was like living under communism. Got word that we can cruise. Tonight, at dinner, the crew was introduced and then we danced to live music. Wonderful day to start a cruise! Next: Bratislava and Vienna, Austria.

Book Talk

I have read many books the past several weeks, and I couldn't find one book that stood out from the rest, so I am going to write a brief summary of one that has been listed as best seller, and one by a new author. You choose the best one for you.

"Where the Crawdads Sing" by Delia Owens This book has been listed on The New York Times best-sellers list for so long, I think I felt ashamed that I hadn't read it yet. So when I found it on the shelf of the book mobile I took it home.

The opening chapter starts by the discovery of the body of a local married man named Chase found dead at the bottom of a watch tower. He appears to have been murdered. The nearest inhabitant is Kya, known to the locals as the "Marsh Girl". Kya has lived on the North Carolina Coast all of her life in a shack on Barkley Cove. She and Chase for a brief time were a couple. She soon becomes a suspect.

When Kya was six years old her abused mother left the island. Her siblings followed leaving Kya and one brother alone with an alcoholic father. By the age of 8 her brother was gone, and her father was leaving her for several weeks at a time forcing her to fish and dig mussels on the beach to sell at the wharf store in order to survive. At age 10 her father disappears and the only thing she has for company are the gulls, an elderly couple from the wharf store that give her used clothing, and boy named Tate: a young fisherman that teaches her to read.

Learning to read opens up a new world for her. Her inherited artistic ability from her mother allows her to explore the island and the marsh environment, recording and writing what she learns. The rest of the book follows her growth as a woman, her relationship to Tate, and her eventual trial for the murder of Chase. Did she murder Chase? How could she? She had an alibi...maybe.

I felt the book was well done, but to be honest

at times I felt her surroundings a little unrealistic. Here is a child of six surviving on an island by herself, and she never encounters anything in her environment that endangers her: not a spider, a snake, a crocodile, sickness, or a hurricane ever comes in or blows down her shack. The only thing that endangers her paradise in the beginning is the truant officer from school...which by the way she never attends after the first day.

"The Killer in Me" by Olivia Kiernan

This is the second book published by Olivia Kiernan, an Irish writer living in the United Kingdom. This is a fast paced murder mystery that is 333 pages long.

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

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Astronomy Corner

A Brief History of Astronomy: Part 2

Previously, we traced the early beginnings of astronomy, including attempts to describe the earth's size, shape and orbit, and the linkage of astronomical occurrences to calendar dates. We concluded with Copernicus up-ending the earth-centered theory by placing the sun in the center of the solar system. It was Kepler who drove the next nail into the 'geocentric' theory's coffin.

Johannes Kepler (1571-1630)

Born in Germany, Kepler held various municipal consulting and teaching jobs in mathematics in his early years. But the inflection point in his life came in 1600, when he met astronomer Tycho Brahe in Prague. Brahe had spent 30 years observing and cataloguing planetary movements against the background of 1,005 stars and now invited Kepler to analyze this data. Kepler accepted, producing, over a span of 10 years, his three laws of planetary motion.

Kepler's 1st Law: All planetary orbits are elliptical, not circular.

Kepler's 2nd Law: Planets sweep out equal areas in equal times on their orbits around the sun. (Fig.1) This means, since their speeds are inversely proportionate to their distances from the sun, that their orbital velocities are constantly changing, increasing or slowing to cover more or less ground when their orbits take them closer or further from the sun. We call this change in velocities acceleration. Kepler never used this term, and probably didn't realize the significance of it.

Kepler's 3rd Law states that the square of a planet's orbital period is equal to the cube of its mean distance from the sun (Fig. 2). Never mind the squares and cubes. The point is that two of these quantities were already known: if you know the orbital period (the length of time it takes a planet to go around the sun), then you can determine the planet's distance from the sun. And when the mean earth-sun distance (called the Astronomical Unit, or A.U.) was measured in 1769, it was simple algebra to get the 4th quantity: the other planet's mean distance to the sun for any date into the future.

Kepler spent the next 9 years applying his 3rd law to all the planets, publishing his findings in 1627 as the Rudolphine Tables, three years before his death.

Kepler's laws briefly halted the debate on orbital mechanics, though progress in astronomy led to bigger and better telescopes; spectroscopy; the periodic table; and the recognition of a new set of particles below the atomic level. But acceleration - a.k.a. gravity -- was the thread that knitted it all together, beginning with Galileo.

Galileo (1564-1642)

Called the Father of Modern Science by Einstein, this Renaissance man from Pisa wrote books and treatises on everything having to do with physics and mathematics. For us, his two most important works were on the moons of Jupiter and the experiments with falling bodies.

Jupiter's Moons: Using the newlyinvented telescope, Galileo first observed Jupiter's four principal moons in 1610 (later named the Galilean moons in his honor. (Photo 1) Their orbits followed Kepler's Laws with clockwork precision; you could set your watch by when each moon passed in front of or behind the planet. Tables of these predicted times were drawn up and used to measure distances (longitudes) between various landmarks. This technique was tried at sea, but the telescopes were still too small, and the error of measurements taken from the deck of a pitching ship too great, to be useful. The gimbaled sea-going clock eventually replaced the Galilean longitude technique.

Falling Bodies: Galileo probably never dropped objects of different weights off the leaning tower of Pisa. What he did do was roll balls of the same size but different weights down ramps, then measured how long it took them to hit the ground. They all picked up speed at a constant rate and hit the bottom in the same elapsed time. Galileo called this 'acceleration' – which means 'addition of speed' in Italian. This was the first use of what would be an equivalent term for gravity.

Galileo's writings ran afoul of Church dogma, and he was accused of heresy in 1633 and placed in house arrest until his death in 1642 at age 77.

Isaac Newton (1642-1727)

From an affectionless childhood, Newton grew into a tormented, neurotic adult, incapable of love or even friendship. But his analytic mind earned him a 30-year tenure in the Lucasian Chair of Mathematics at Cambridge, where he wrote his monumental Principia Mathematica. This work contained his three Laws of Motion and his Universal Law of Gravitation.

His motion laws were influenced by Galileo's studies of the role of acceleration on falling bodies ("a body at rest tends to stay at rest,"...etc.) and by his invention of calculus, a mathematical tool for determining the rate of change of moving objects. As for gravity, he viewed this force simply as the attraction between two bodies of mass M1 and M2, separated by a distance R and diminished by the inverse square of that distance. (Fig. 3, where G is a constant). Using these two laws, Newton calculated the orbits of the sun, moon and all the planets

But two questions arose:

First, how was this force transmitted between the two objects? Newton didn't know. (Today, we call it a 'graviton').

Second, how fast did the force act?




Photo 1 Galilean moons of Jupiter




Fig. 1 Kepler's 2nd Law




Fig. 2 Kepler's 3rd Law

Instantaneously, Newton thought.

But this means it would have to travel at infinite velocity, which, as Einstein showed in his theory of Special Relativity 300 years later, was impossible: nothing could travel faster than light; it was the universe's speed limit.

Finally, as we discuss in the next chapter, Einstein also had a better idea for gravity. He called it 'General Relativity.'




Fig. 3 Newton's gravity equation


