Recently, there have been a substantial number of reports of unsightly trash littering our community. To gather additional feedback, I posted a survey on NextDoor to find out what more of our neighbors really think.

The results were very clear: you feel like trash has become a problem, and even better, most of you are willing to help clean it up. Several Foundation Board members drove through the community to see if we could identify areas of particular concentration, to try to develop a Clean Up plan. Much of the trash we observed is on the sides of county roads. That doesn't make the project impossible, but it does slow us down.

We'll contact the county to determine what requirements exist for such a trash clean up event on public roads, if they'll allow us to do it. Stay tuned here, and on NextDoor for developments and updates.

In the meantime, let's start close to home: when you take your trash and recycling cans out each week, take a moment to look up and down your own property line. Many tiny items blow out as the cans are emptied into the trucks and even if they did see something, the drivers aren't able to get out each time.

It's funny, this exercise has made me more aware of what small things I can do to help in my own daily routine. I pick up trash in my office parking lot as I come in the mornings – I think about what our CEO would think if she saw this stuff! Why is it here? In front of my dentist's office, in front of the golf club tavern. Obviously, I can't do it everywhere, but what small changes can we make in our own community, if we all just take a few more steps?

Attendance has been modest, but the cost per attendee is, by far, the highest of any event we sponsor. The cost to obtain the license to legally show the movie in public is nearly \$300 per movie, even as a non-profit.

While we were able to find very generous donors in the Meadows Deli Market, Roadrunner Publications (who publishes this newspaper) and realtors Dave Buckley of Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices, and Jennifer Hill of HomeSmart Realty, to sponsor last year's movies, the Board unanimously agrees that this is not the best community use of our limited donated

Lastly, most of the equipment is borrowed; the logistics of moving it back and forth and ensuring it works properly each time are quite difficult and in the case of the final movie last year, sadly insurmountable.

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

This exhibition is part of the overall exhibition of Endangered: Exploring California's Changing Ecosystems.


January 10 is the opening reception for CCAE members: 4:30-6 p.m., 6–8 p.m. for the public.

The Blue Danube: Passau to Budapest

The Rhine, the Rhone, the Danube and the Po Rise in the Alps, and in four directions flow.

Odd, how the mnemonics of 4th grade geography can stick in your head. In my mind, the Danube has always had an air of glamour, of seduction, waltzing in Vienna -- feelings not associated with the other major rivers of Europe. The Rhine was linked to fortifications and wars, the Rhone and the Po did not feature in the history I attended to, or in my readings, and so lacked personality. Thus when my traveling buddy and I thought of a European river cruise, I proposed Viking's Blue Danube Cruise, and she immediately said that was her choice, too.

Idalia Rewar did a great report for our readers on her Blue Danube cruise in May, but our choices of tours and stopovers differed, and I thought to write about our experiences.

Leslie and I left in mid April from LAX, and had a non eventful flight through Toronto to Munich. Our pre trip package from Viking included a sticky tag to apply to our shirts on arrival in Munich. A Viking staff member met us immediately on exiting baggage claim, and within about half an hour we were on a bus to Passau, Germany where our cruise began. Our itinerary was a day in Passau, then 3 days in Austria with stops in Linz, Krems and Vienna, a day in Slovakia in Bratislava, and then on to Budapest where we had one day on the boat and extended our stay for 3 days at the Hotel Moments.

I had planned to get a mobility scooter for this trip so I could go on the walking tours and keep up with the group, but Viking said that their boats did not accommodate scooters, but could handle rolling walkers. I got one with a seat and a pouch, and it worked beautifully -I was able to keep up with the group and not worry about tripping on the cobblestones that were the universal paving in the center of the cities we visited. An added benefit was that it proved useful for carrying souvenirs and jackets. The airlines took the walker as checked baggage and did not charge extra for it.

The bus ride from Munich to Passau was comfortable enough for many of our group to take naps, but I was more interested in seeing the countryside and the small villages spaced out between farmland and woods. Our first good look at the Danube was not very blue!

Our ship was the Viking Ingvi, with 4 levels: Passau: St. Stephan's Cathedral the lowest was cabins, crew quarters, kitchen, etc, then 2 passenger levels connected by an elevator, with cabins, a small library & shopping area. There was a restaurant, lounge and deck area for meals. Cabins were small but had adequate storage. The top level was an open deck reached by several staircases. Wifi was free, but speed was variable, mostly slow. I used my cell phone for most web searching - my cell phone provider is Verizon, and with a call in advance of the trip, I activated unlimited calling and generous data usage for \$10/day.

I agree with Idalia's ship review that the food was good, the evening entertainment very enjoyable, and the crew knowledgeable and pleasant. The ship has



a maximum of 190 passengers, but there were not that many on our trip, an advantage in meeting and spending time with congenial fellow travelers.

Our second day on the ship in Passau we took the included leisurely 2 hour walking tour. Passau's location on the bank of 3 rivers (Danube, Inn, Ilx) make it prone to flooding - highest recorded was 42 feet above the river level with the center of the city having flood marks on some of the buildings that were 12 feet or more above street level. We visited St. Stephen's Cathedral, a baroque church built over several years in the late 1600's. We saw the Bishop's palace, the squares and small shops, including one seemingly

devoted to images, jewelry and statues of dachshunds - they even have a dachshund museum there! Also the Shamrock Irish Pub with a large sign assuring they provided Guinness beer as well as Lowenbrau.

We left Passau about 1pm, and passed our abandon ship safety drill at 2pm. Soon thereafter, we passed through a lock on the Danube which lowered us about 20 feet. This surprised me – I hadn't thought about locks on this river, but given that it rises in the Alps, it obviously loses altitude as it flows to the Black Sea. There are 18 locks on the Danube.


In Linz, we took an optional (added cost) tour of the Austrian countryside, mostly rolling farmland, and learned how to knead and make the various twists and braids of the local breads. While the bread was baking, we were off to a lumberyard which was also home to a distillery. And of course, we sampled the liqueur and bought some to take home. We then returned to the farm for a late lunch, and enjoyed the bread we had participated in making as well as cheese, cold cuts, and fruit.

In Linz we saw 2 river ships docked side by side. In mid April, we only had one stop where we had to moor alongside another river cruiser. In high season, ships may be docked out alongside 5 or 7 other boats so that the center boats only have a view of another boat when docked, and would have to traverse several boats to get to and from the shore. There is no problem in moving from one ship across another, even with mobility problems – I was using a walker, but I much preferred the stops where you had a river view from one side, and a city view from the other – views not blocked by neighboring ships.

We passed through beautiful countryside and another lock on our way to Krems, The tour there was of Gottlied Abbey, well described by Idalia. We covered the same ground in Vienna as Idalia. An interesting note is that we were in Vienna on Palm Sunday, and instead of people

getting palms, they were selling bunches of pussy willows outside the cathedral.

Bratislava, Slovakia, is another lovely city with an interesting mix of medieval architecture and very modern buildings and bridges. The city has many statues – the usual ones honoring kings and queens and generals, including a beautiful "Victory" honoring the Red Army for saving them during World War 2. There are also many whimsical statues, like the one Idalia included in her article of the Watcher, a man with head and shoulders emerging from a seeming manhole. There was also another Irish pub – this one

called the Dubliner with live music every weekend and a huge candy cane in the window: a candy cane in April, why?

On our way to Budapest, we sailed past the city of Esztergom, whose Basilica is the largest in Hungary. We would reach Budapest that evening.

I loved our river ship experience. It did not have all the amenities, bars, lounges, restaurants, shops, pools, etc of the ocean going ships, but it provided more of a sense of connection with the places we visited, the people we saw, the people we traveled with. It is something like the difference in driving coast to coast in the United States compared with flying coast to coast. Flying is an exercise in discontinuity: Point A to Point



B, with little to no sense of what's between. Driving the roads or following the river path across a landscape impresses with the sense of flow from cities to small towns to open country, and the connectedness between them, an appreciation of belonging to a whole, that hop scotching from one place to another just doesn't provide.

Next month, I'll write about Budapest - a beautiful and amazing city.



BOOK Talk by Lynn Clark

"If We Had Known" by Elise Juska - published in 2018

Maggie Daley is a college professor at a small local college in Maine. She has been teaching Freshman Composition for 28 years, and she looks forward to a new class every Fall. She knows things will change this year because her only child Anna is off to college, and being a single divorced mother means the house will be empty for the first time in many years. As she enters the house on that hot August day she sees the scattered evidence of packing by her daughter. Anna has had her issues growing up. She was diagnosed and treated for an eating disorder last year, but to Maggie right now, she seems to have everything under control.

When her daughter runs down the stairs shouting about a mass shooting at a nearby mall, she is stunned by the terrible news. The coverage reveals that three people have been killed, and one person is in intensive care. The shooter, Nathan Dugan, has killed himself and Anna's next question is "Wasn't he one of your students?". Maggie's mind starts to recall Nathan, the student. She remembers he was quiet most of the time, didn't participate much, and wore unusual clothing. Grade wise he was an average student. He was easy to ignore because it was as if he wasn't mentally involved in the class. This is not unusual because her class is a requirement for all Freshman, so sometimes the student just doesn't want to be there. She remembers he used to bring a dog to class. She thought he was different, but never had the impression that he was violent. She

really didn't pay too much attention to him when he was in class 4 years ago.

Luke Finch also remembers Nathan. He was in the same class that Fall. His perception of Nathan corresponds in many ways to Maggie's, but she doesn't know this, because Maggie isn't on Facebook, and she deliberately stays away from the social media scene. When Luke goes online to describe his feelings he also mentions the clothing and the dog, but then he says "He wrote this paper that was really weird." He admits that he really doesn't know what the word "weird" means in relationship to Nathan, but maybe there was something wrong with him. He now wishes he would have stepped forward and helped him. His post goes viral.

Bill Wall is the Dean of Education at Maggie's school. He becomes aware of the post and calls Maggie late at night to ask her to come into his office the next day, and bring Nathan's final paper from her class. It is a requirement at her college that these papers be kept as a source of reference of student work. When she admits she hasn't seen Luke's post he starts explaining why the school needs to be prepared: the danger of the school being incriminated by the post going viral, and the word "weird" in reference to Nathan's paper. So that night she goes on Facebook and reads Luke's post. She interprets his words as a personal recollection, a feeling of guilt, and a sympathetic view of a former student. She doesn't understand Bill Wall's reaction. The next day she finds and rereads Nathan's final paper.

"The Hunting Trip" by Nathan Dugan

"On Saturday morning in October my Dad and me decided to go hunting.......I have hunted many times with many different types of weapons......shotgunsAR-10s and AR-15s....if I had to choose one for a home invasion...to multiple targets at close range." *

There was no ending, no final paragraph, and nothing to indicate that there was a purpose to the paper other than to describe the multiple weapons he knew about. Maggie's comments on the paper indicated this, but she is starting to get a little nervous.

She is late to the Dean's office the next day because she runs into a traffic jam as she tries to pass the mall. A makeshift memorial and people driving slowly by the scene of the shooting impedes her progress. When she finally enters the Dean's office she sees he is not his normal self. He starts taking notes while he asks her questions. He seems to be emphasizing certain words and rephrasing sentences to indicate emotional problems Nathan might have exhibited. He indicates that this is the twenty-first century, her years of teaching, anxiety issues, student safety, and the red flags exhibited by Nathan that might have been missed.

For the first time Maggie feels fear and when he asks her for the paper she does the unthinkable.... she lies and tells him she cannot locate it.

When the police go to Nathan's home they find

numerous weapons, and all have been legally purchased. His single mother says the paper he wrote for the school was false because his father was never part of his life, and they never went hunting together.

The story certainly doesn't end there. No, because from there the social media spreads the story along with the comments, the accusations, and the sensationalism of Nathan's crime and the names of the victims. It also mentions that Nathan had just been fired from Walmart.

How his paper ends up being published in the newspaper is another part of Maggie's story. How the social media affects her daughter's life at college is tragic in many ways; but the whole novel with every revelation made the reader aware that this story is being repeated way too often in our world today.

*I did not include the whole paper because it just listed various guns and their uses.

** The very day I was editing this review the news came on with the announcement of the shooting in Santa Clarita. The facts concerning the shooting at Saugus High School were very limited. The motive was never very clear. The boy had friends and a girlfriend, but didn't have a stable home life. His father had been arrested for domestic violence and was an alcoholic. He died in 2017. The shooter used what was called a "ghost gun" and the authorities

found multiple guns in the home.

Simultaneously, the Wall Street Journal published an article called "Shooter Study Raises Doubts On Readiness" by Zusha Elinson. The article in the newspaper was based on a study that went back 50 yrs. and pulled up data from 171 incidents of shootings where four or more people were killed. Here are some of the points made in the article:

- 1. The number of deaths has increased every decade and attacks are more frequent.
- 2. The most common area for a shooting is a work site.
- 3. There doesn't seem to be a single profile, but some common factors regarding perpetrators depend on their age and the location of the shooting.
- 4. 48.5% of guns used are purchased legally.
- 5. Nearly 1/2 of the perpetrators shared their intentions on social media.
 - 6. Two-thirds had mental health problems.

This study was funded by a grant from the National Institute of Justice a part of the U.S. Justice Department.

The one thing that surprised me was the statement that "the cost of drills for children outweigh the benefits" because most shooters are already within the school confines and know the procedures that are in place. It is better to have trained adults in place. What do you think?

- 12 slices of day-old white bread, cubed (or, 8 oz. shredded potatoes, thawed)
- 1 lb shredded cheddar/ Monterey Jack/ mixed cheese
- 1 lb of chopped, cooked bacon (or crumbled, cooked mild breakfast sausage)
- 2 4 oz.cans chopped green chiles
- 6 eggs
- 3.5 cup milk
- ½ tsp dry mustard

Grease or spray pan to prepare.

Mix eggs, milk, mustard in separate bowl. Layer bread, cheese, bacon and green chilies in casserole pan. Pour egg mixture over top, gently mix to distribute ingredients. Refrigerate overnight.

Bake 400 degrees, 45-60 min, or until center is set.

********** **Apple French Toast Casserole**

1 cup + 1 TBS brown sugar

- ½ cup butter
- 1 (8 oz) loaf of crusty French bread, cubed
- 2 cups milk
- 6 eggs
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 TBSP brown sugar
- 2 small apples, chopped

Grease/ spray pan to prepare

Melt 1 cup brown sugar and ½ cup butter over medium heat til dissolved, to make

While heating caramel, in a separate bowl, blend eggs, milk, vanilla.

When caramel is fully dissolved, pour into prepared baking pan. Spread bread and apples evenly over pan, sprinkle with cinnamon. Pour egg mixture gently over top, soaking all bread cubes. Sprinkle 1 TBS brown sugar over top.

Rest in refrigerator overnight.

Bake, uncovered, at 450 degrees for 35-40 min, until center is set.

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
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The Winter Sky: Part 2

In Part 1 of this series, I introduced Charles Messier and his catalogue of astronomical objects and then focused on one of these: Orion and its Great Nebula. There's another, more recent, catalogue called the New General Catalogue (NGC). First compiled in 1888, it held 7840 objects. An additional 5386 were added in 1908.

Open Clusters

One of the NGC catalogue listings is the Double Open Cluster in Perseus (NGC 869, 844), located in the NE sky at the top of the Perseus star cloud and easily visible to the naked eye (Fig. 1). The stars in these two clusters are not necessarily near each other, though they are formed from the same star cloud and contain a few thousand stars, all roughly the same age.

The Pleaides Open Cluster (M-45) is probably the most dramatic example of these star formations (Fig. 2). Though the stars appear spatially related, once again they are not gravitationally bound. This cluster has been described since ancient times: on the walls of Egyptian tombs, in the Bible, and in Greek mythology, where they were referred to as the Seven Sisters. Now, they are used by sky watchers as a measure of "seeing:" If you can count six or more of these stars, you have good seeing. What you won't be able to see with the naked eye is the reflection nebulosities surrounding some of these stars, as seen in the attached photo. Orlov, Chiang & Crane, in 2000, reported that for the past few hundred years Andean farmers have used the appearance of the Pleiades as a seasonal forecasting guide for rainfall; cirrus clouds associated with the El Niño weather cycle obscure the fainter stars.

Another striking example of an open cluster is the Rosette Nebula, NGC 2244 (Fig. 3), whose stars are embedded in a nebular cloud (NGC 2238).

Globular Clusters

These clusters are dramatically different from the open ones, and definitely ARE spatially close and tightly bound to one another by gravity. They typically contain hundreds of thousands of stars, up to half a million, all of which formed at the same time, 4.5 billion years ago. All orbit the galactic center in a halo-like distribution. Globular clusters are among the oldest objects in the Milky Way.

M-22 (Fig. 4) was the first globular discovered and is one of the brightest and largest among them. It's also my personal favorite.

In conclusion, there are open clusters, globular clusters and a spectrum of colorful nebula out there at night to tease your eye. All you need do is look up!


