When you think of Valley Center Western Days, it conjures images of our rich California history, and times gone by. It also brings to mind a long-standing tradition orchestrated for, and supported by, the Valley Center community.

This year, the 70th annual Western Days Country Fair & Parade, will feature a community-centric parade, a "Guns N Hoses" Chili Cook-off to benefit the Valley Center Fire Protection District Explorer Scouts, and a festive family-oriented Country Fair with a variety of inviting music, food and vendors.

Valley Center Business Association partner Western Days, Inc., the champion of this festival, is a non-profit organization overseen by a seven-member board of directors, comprised of local business owners and community leaders, and supported by the efforts of the Valley Center History Museum and Valley Center Historical Society.

Rich History, Local Tradition

The primary purpose of Western Days, Inc. is to preserve this hometown event for residents and visitors alike. Tabled last year due to pandemic restrictions, Western Days is back in all its glory this July 4th weekend. This familiar local festival and parade offers a wholesome and fun avenue to celebrate our Western heritage and all that Valley Center offers.

"Western Days was originally established as a country fair, and has continued its tradition of offering a well-attended festival with a nod to our country town, and its fascinating place in the region's deep-rooted agricultural and ranching history," said Western Days Chairwoman Gina Roberts, a 34-year VC resident, and president of the Western Days, Inc. board since its formation in 2016.

According to Laura Gordon, a VC resident since 2004, vice president of the Western Days, Inc. board and 2021 parade chairwoman, Western Days festivities have been a part of Valley Center since 1950. "I am very excited that Western Days will be able to be held this year," she said. "The pandemic has been so hard on so many, and here's hoping this event will bring some normalcy and joy to our community."

She added, "Western Days is our town's biggest event, and, even though Valley Center is growing and changing, I think it really captures the small town feel that most of us love about living here."

An Inclusive Theme

The theme of this year's festival is "Better Together" said longstanding Western Days coordinator, and owner of The Roadrunner, Justin Salter. Western Days always asks the community for feed-

Bill Medley, the survivor of the Righteous Brothers duo and his new partner, Bucky Heard will be bringing the deep rich bass baritone of hits that transcend the generations, such as "Unchained Melody," "The Time of My Life" and "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling" (the most played song in radio history) to Pala Casino this weekend on the 4th of July.

I was able to interview Medley about his career and his unusual voice, which he said, he never thought of as unusual when he was younger.

"Nobody in my family has a baritone," he recalled. "I probably realized my voice was unusual when we recorded 'You've Lost that Lovin' Feeling.' We had recorded about three years before that and had some successful West

Mountain Meadow Equine Rehab and Rescue

Did you know we have a horse rescue right in the neighborhood? Doug Stoodt started this venture in 2014. Why would a man who had been an attorney for 40 years start a horse rescue during his retirement? Because Doug is passionate about horses and rescuing those that he can. Are you passionate about horses too? Then they could use your help either by volunteering or donating to this great cause. Mountain Meadow rescue currently has 15 horses on the property.

Each one of these horses has a story. Where do these rescues come from? Several are from relinquishments. That means someone who had a horse and decided they didn't want to maintain the animal any longer. Relinquishes can happen for financial reasons or when an owner passes away. Some of the horses they have rescued have come from disaster areas. They adopted 3 from the Paradise fire in Northern California. Many of these horses wind up in Kill Pens waiting for a morbid end. Doug and the other volunteers at Mountain Meadow will take these horses and this is where the individual stories come in. The volunteers will work with the horses. They may have been through some traumatic experiences and

most will need gentling. They work to retrain and care for the horses until they are ready to be adopted out to a new owner who will care for and love them.

Another group of horses who are great candidates for rescue are off track thoroughbreds. They are typically 3-4 years old and the racing life will have taken its toll. These horses suffer many injuries to their legs and tendons running on the track. They are also injected with performance enhancing drugs. Off track thoroughbreds needs to detox for several months after arriving at the rescue before they can begin to be worked with at all. They will need to be retrained for their new life and new job after their racing career.

Then there are the rescue horses that come from Bureau of Land Management land. These are wild mustangs that have been rounded up in order to manage wild herds that do not have enough resources. They have tattoos on their neck for identification purposes. They need people to gentle them with care and training so they can be adopted by responsible owners.

The 2021 HMCF Scholarship Application window is currently open and has been extended to Saturday, July 31. We have chosen to extend the deadline this year to allow applicants extra time to coordinate required application elements remotely. Additionally, as there have been so many confusing plans about the how fall semester will operate, this allows applicants to be more certain of their higher education plans. We will coordinate with each individual recipient to present awards no later than August 31, pending confirmation that the institution is still offering classes in the fall semester.

Eligibility requirements include:

- Be a Hidden Meadows resident
- Be a recent or pending high school graduate
- Plan to attend college in the Fall semester
- Not have previously received a Bachelor's Degree
- Not have previously received a HMCF Scholarship
- Never have been convicted of a felony or possessing/selling illegal drugs
- Be a US Citizen or Resident Alien
- Have a high school GPA of 3.5 or above on a 4.0 scale that has been certified by an official school transcript or GED

How Did the Sellers Faire Start?

When Linda Collins asked me to write an article about the beginnings of the Sellers Faire, I thought 'no problem'. Then I started thinking about how much has changed since that day. So here I go down Memory Lane.

Twenty-six years ago, there were two large organizations for the Hidden Meadows area. The Foundation was the 501c3 charitable organization and the Area of Resident Owners – ARO – was the social group.

The ARO was self-sustaining by having events. The biggest and most popular event was the Luau. Don Elliott and crew would fire up the deep pit, toss in the pig and enjoy the night while the pig cooked. The rest of the menu was provided by the ARO. In the morning Bill Pickens and crew would set up the dining tents, tables and chairs. The community would buy tickets, BYO and be ready for a great time with Hula dancers, Hawaiian music, and BBQ. The silent auction would also bring in a large amount of fun and money. All the proceeds went to the Foundation for scholarships, community beautification and neighbor assistance. This and other events just about completely funded the Foundation.

So, what about the Sellers Faire? One evening sitting in my living room with friends, eating hot dogs and talking about the baseball season, the Sellers Faire was founded. Sally Langpap had the idea. She mentioned that as you drove through the community, oranges, lemons and other citrus would just drop on the ground and rot. Why not contact the owners and ask for the fruit? The idea was to sell the fruit at a community event to help fund the ARO's activities.

The ARO asked the Meadows Home Association if the upper parking lot at the pavilion could be used for the event. The MHA said yes. We were off and running and the Seller's Faire was created.

In the beginning, the Faire featured mainly home-grown vegetables, fruit and yes, succulents. I introduced succulents to the Sellers Faire. We also had an extreme coupon collector who used double and triple times coupons to get items free at grocery stores. She always brought toothpaste, soap, and other items for sale. Many neighbors just brought what they had grown, selling to other neighbors at great prices. Neighbors were helping neighbors. It became a gathering.

Locations changed over time as the number of sellers increased. Items for sale are now just about anything and everything.

One thing, however, has never changed, the fun and friendship the Sellers Faire has brought to our community.

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ers and show support for our first responders. We are really looking forward to having Valley Center back out in our community, and having fun together." Roberts concluded, "Putting on these events is a lot of work, and very expensive, but it is so worth it to see everyone out and having a good time!"

The Horizon Fuel Center (San Pasqual Economic Development Corporation) is the festival's Title Sponsor. Co-sponsors include the County of San Diego Parks & Recreation and The Roadrunner. Other sponsors include Valley Center Wireless (Festival Main Stage), Cosmic Solar & Roofing (Parade Cash Prizes), Main Street Oceanside, A-1 Irrigation, Valley Center Orthodontics,

and Native Oaks Golf Club.

Western Days Parade

The Western Days Parade, which follows a route from Cole Grade Road to Lilac Road, ends at the Valley Center Community Center. "This year will feature over 80 entries," said Roberts. "We have a very good turnout based on putting this entire event together in about seven weeks." Fifth District Supervisor Jim Desmond will lead the parade as Grand Marshal.

Parade watchers are encouraged to find a spot along the route, bring chairs, hats, sunscreen and water. "This week particularly, it is important to be aware of the heat index,

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Coast hits. When we did 'Loving Feeling' they found my baritone voice and that set me off on a different style I guess. Both Bobby and I were raised listening to rhythm and blues and I emulated that style. I wasn't trying to but I was obsessed with Little Richard and Ray Charles. I still don't think I have an unusual voice but I guess I'm used to hearing it."

Asked what his most requested hit is, Medley replied, "It used to be 'You've Lost That Loving Feeling,' but 'Unchained Melody' I would suppose is neck and neck with it."

Medley still occasionally writes song but points out, "I never wrote any of the songs that are hit records. I still write a couple of songs a year."

His own favorite songs include "Just Once in My Life," by Carole King, and "You'll Never Walk Alone," from "Carousel." He added, "I did like 'Carousel.' I liked Shirley Jones for sure but I knew it from Roy Hamilton who recorded it in the 50s. That's where we got 'Unchained Melody, 'which was very good to us."

Although the music of the Righteous Brothers enjoyed a revival in the 1980s when their work was used in movies such as "Ghost," "Dirty Dancing" and "Top Gun," sometimes they didn't know their songs would pop up until someone told them about it. " 'I Had the Time of my Life" I recorded for the movie, "Dirty Dancing," Medley recalled, "But they put 'Unchained Melody' in 'Ghost' from the original record. We didn't know about that until someone came and told us."

What it's like singing with his daughter? He answered, "The only song I sing with her is 'I Had the Time of my Life. 'It's wonderful to have my daughter on the road with me. It's wonderful to work with your child."

He described how he and Bucky Heard became partners: "I was working in Branson, Missouri, and so was he. We had been friends for a long time and I knew he was a really good singer and performer and he was a great guy.

He was at a theater doing a tribute to Journey, and I went to see him and it knocked me out. I thought 'If he can sing Steve Perry, he can probably do Bobby Hatfield.' A lot of people wanted to see that music. We put it together and it worked amazingly good, thank

Is he finding new fans as he goes out on tour again? "You know," he said, "the majority are people raised on the music but there are a lot of younger people who learned them in the movies in the 1980s. It's been very cool and very great."

He is still quite active musically. "We're doing a residency in Las Vegas this year in October, November and December at the South Point Hotel, probably 40-50 concerts. It's not the shows, it's the traveling that's rough, you know."

Pala Casino Spa Resort will celebrate the Fourth of July with a weekend full of live entertainment. Throughout the weekend, concerts will include Pink Floyd tribute by Which One's Pink,

The Boogie Knights, Little River Band, and The Righteous Brothers with Bill Medley.

They're the ones that take up a case when the police have come to a dead end, the sources and clues have dried up, the case turns cold, and a loved one is still missing. These people search for the missing, and they are not professional police or private eyes. They are just people that care.

Frankie Elkin is such a person. She finds her missing individuals on line. She travels light with a few possessions to the last known location of the missing person. She has come to Boston to a neighborhood called Mattapan that is mostly populated by Haitian immigrants. It is a poor and crime-ridden

A young girl named Angelique Badeau disappeared after leaving school months ago, and hasn't been found. Elkin's mission in life right now is to find this young girl and bring her home alive... something she has not been able to do for the last 10 years and the last 14 people she has located.

When she enters an area she assumes a low key appearance, and finds a minimum wage job to give her enough money to exist and find a place to stay. She usually ends up as a bar keeper, an unusual job for someone who is a recovering alcoholic and needs to attend AA meetings to keep herself sober. What she has found is that a neighborhood bar is the best place to start...to get information...to ask the right questions...to follow the leads... and to anger the local police and stir things up. It has been 8 months since Angelique Badeau disappeared, and that's a long time for someone to be missing and still be alive, but Elkin has hope. This is one young girl she wants to bring home alive, and as she gets closer to the truth she finds herself in more danger.

If you enjoy wine tasting but prefer to stay close to home, Estate d'Iacobelli is a hidden gem. This winery is owned by Dr. Ronei and Lisa Iacobelli. The owners live and work in Michigan but travel frequently to California where they have several acres committed to wine as well as olive and citrus trees. Ronei's family is from Casalvieri, a town in the Italian province of Frosinone, where his grandfather taught him the art of making wine. Ronei and Lisa have 15 acres along the Pala Mesa Golf resort where they have their tasting room and an additional 20 acres on the De Portola Wine Trail,

Their wines are a combination of French and Italian varietals blended to produce well balanced wines easy to drink and enjoy. Some of the blending combinations were varietals such as fiano and chardonnay. Italian meets French and pulls off a personal favorite from this trip. Other featured whites were Viognier and some Rhone blends. There was an Italian rose of sangiovese and primativo (Zinfandel). The reds continued the same mixture of Italian meets French influence with Barbera and Sangiovese blended with Mourvedre and Cabernet Franc.

The views were stunning and they have live entertainment most Saturday afternoons. The overall experience was one that I would definitely recommend.

San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) and Caltrans (the state transportation department) want your input on how these agencies can create a "comprehensive set of safe, sustainable, and equitable transportation solutions that will make it faster, safer, and easier to travel through North County."

This effort is called the Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan (CMCP.) The North County study area is one of the first highway corridors prioritized by the SANDAG board. It includes Oceanside, Carlsbad, Vista, San Marcos and Escondido and unincorporated North County.

SANDAG and Caltrans invite you to attend a virtual public meeting on July 8, 6:30-8 p.m. and to take a survey that they have up.

SANDAG and Caltrans are working with local stakeholders and the public to improve North County's transportation system. We're studying ways to reduce traffic congestion, support climate action initiatives, and generate more clean transportation choices. These efforts will increase access to the corridor for all who live in, work in, or visit North County. At our upcoming meeting, you can:

"Learn more about the North County Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan

Provide feedback on transportation needs and opportunities for North County Participate in a Q&A with project team members."

Participants can provide real time input on transportation needs and opportunities in North County and speak with project team members about major transportation facilities including the Sprinter light rail between the Oceanside and Escondido transit centers, the SR 78/I-15 interchange, the western portions of State Route 76 (SR 76), and the Inland Rail Trail bike path between Oceanside and Escondido.

The North County Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan virtual engagement hub is a one-stop shop to learn more about the project and stay up-to-date on surveys and public meetings. With its interactive map feature, you can provide specific feedback using virtual pins on a map of the North County study

Caltrans' project manager for North County Corridors Kareem Scarlet, told The Hidden Meadows News, "We've been getting increased interest in our survey so we've decided to keep it open. At this time we have not compiled the results."

Scarlet said this is relevant to the two agencies "taking the Big Five Moves concept and making them real projects on the ground."

The "Big Five Moves," is strategy developed by SANDAG that include:

Complete Corridors (multimodal roads) Transit Leap (fast and flexible transit) Mobility Hubs (connection Points) Flexible Fleets (First and last mile options) Next OS (OS standing for Operating System)

"The July 8 public meeting is the way for us to share some of the information we have gathered so far as respect to study areas and travel behaviors," said Scarlet. "We also have a social pinpoint website which allows folks to drop in comments on a map to talk about issues within their community."

The survey, which has been up for about four months, has gotten 1,030 responses and 49 Social Pinpoint comments so far.

Scarlet added, "Our hope is to pique a little more interest so we can get a larger following in the meeting. Over one thousand comments is good for a survey but for an area with 600,000 people, if we can get some more participation it's bet-

Scarlet added, "The way we see it the July 8 meeting is us sharing to the public on the study so far and doing public input gathering, polling and a question and answer session when questions can be asked and answered."

SANDAG's Project Manager and Senior Transit Planner Brian Lane also spoke to The Hidden Meadows News. "In the next three months we will be transitioning to show them all the things we have learned," he said. "Let them know and ask them what is missing that is important to them to consider as we make proposed suggestions for transportation fixes. We aren't ready to talk about specific proposals. This is a listening session, so that we capture the needs."

Lane said they are looking at an August to September timeframe to produce a draft document.

"At that time we will have another public meeting, once the draft hits the street," said Scarlet.

Lane added, "I think folks are confused between the regional plan and the corridor work. The regional plan won't be decided until fall and winter but that doesn't mean we can't start moving them forward so we can start working on the planning. The better we can secure state and federal funding, so we can have nearly everything ready so we can apply for those grants."
