

More effective mental health treatment

Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) is one of the most effective tools available for treating severely mentally ill persons. Legislation known as Laura's Law was introduced in 2001 to make AOT available for persons who meet specified criteria for involuntary commitment, such as presenting a danger to themselves or others, or who are gravely disabled. My subsequent legislation, AB 59, extended the sunset date of Laura's Law, and a majority of California's 58 counties are now participating.

This year I will be joining Senator Susan Talamantes Eggman (D – Stockton) to co-author Senate Bill 1035 (SB 1035) which authorizes courts to inquire about the treatment progress of persons receiving AOT. Individuals who have recently left 5150 holds (involuntary 72 hour psychiatric hospitalization) or left conservatorships will benefit from a continuum of care that ensures medication compliance, essential for their recovery. Hopefully, the result will be long-term stabilization for these individuals.

SB 1035 requires the director of outpatient treatment to report to the court every 60 days on the status of persons subject to court ordered AOT, and allows courts to conduct status hearings and require reporting on treatment and adherence to the prescribed medications. The bill is supported by the Psychiatric Physicians Alliance of California, the California State Association of Psychiatrists, the Steinberg Institute, which is a leader in mental health advocacy, and others. SB 1035 passed the Senate without opposition in May, and last week it passed the Assembly Health Committee, on which I sit, also without opposition.

Making AOT more available and effective will get people off the streets, reduce crime and substance abuse, and most importantly, it will save lives. As your state representative, I will continue to work on bipartisan solutions that address serious mental health and public safety issues that impact all Californians.

BOOK REVIEW - By Lynn Clark

"Love and Ruin" - by Paula McLain - Historical Fiction

I have read historical fiction where the book was more fiction then it was historical. This is not the case with this book. The author did a stellar job of writing a story about a young woman seeking to find a way into the world of journalism. Her name was Martha Gellhorn.

Against the backdrop of the Spanish Civil War she manages to gain her credential as a reporter for Collier's magazine and travels to Spain on her own. In a world dominated by male reporters she draws the attention of Ernest Hemingway. While in Spain, he becomes her mentor, idol, and lover. Her articles about the people affected by the war gain her favorable recognition for her work. It is her first taste of success.

Hemingway and Gellhorn eventually marry and move to Cuba. She becomes Hemingway's third wife, and for awhile they find the solitude helps their writing and marriage. When Hemingway's book "For Whom the Bell Tolls" hits the market its huge success puts them in the spotlight. The resulting press releases and necessary book signings start to take a toll on their private life. The marriage starts to chip around the edges and Gellhorn becomes lost in Hemingway's shadow.

World War II is on the horizon and Gellhorn becomes restless. Hemingway wants a stay-at-home wife...Gellhorn wants to go to the front. In an act of betrayal Hemingway asks the editor of Collier's Magazine for her job and she loses her credential. He goes to the front. She is forced to find her own way to the fighting on a cargo ship. Once there she makes her way through several countries and covers all aspects of the war. Her amazing work gives her a unique place in the history of World War II war correspondents.

In the author's note, McLain wrote she went "on to become one of the twentieth century's most significant and celebrated war correspondents, reporting on virtually every major conflict for sixty years..from the Spanish Civil War to the Bay of Pigs, from Vietnam to El Salvador to Panama where she covered the invasion at the age of eighty-one..."

Preventing the Next School Shooting

Over the last 20 years, what once was the safest place for our children - school - has turned into a place of constant worry and questionable security. In the face of overwhelming grief over the tremendous loss of life at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, it feels like we have arrived at a time where school shootings and mass killings are the norm. With school and public venue safety at the top of our minds, I want to remind San Diegans of the efforts the District Attorney's Office has undertaken to prioritize school safety and to emphasize the critical role the public plays in preventing school shootings.

In 2018, San Diego County established a School Threats Protocol, which guides how school, law enforcement and prosecutors respond to school threats. The protocol was updated in 2021 with the help of many agencies. It may be the first of its kind protocol with all 42 school districts in the county participating with the goal of preventing would-be school shooters before they act.

Of course, the protocol is not foolproof, but at its heart it relies on the following:

- Never ignore a threat of harm, no matter the form.
- Every threat is taken seriously, with evidenced-based guidelines for investigation and resolution of the threat.

Taking threats seriously is supported by statistics.

- 93% of school shooters make plans to carry out their attack and
 - 80% of them tell at least one person
 - 60% tell at least two people.

With these odds, it's important for the public to know that you play a vital role in helping prevent school shootings by reporting suspected behavior or threats.

For anyone who thinks it's funny to cause alarm and fear by posting a threat online or calling one into a school, these incidents go beyond a prank: they carry serious legal consequences, such as jail time. Making criminal threats is a felony crime even if there was no intent to carry out the threat; threatening words with the intent to cause fear and which reasonably cause someone to feel fear are sufficient for a felony charge. Juveniles can face jail time, or other consequences such as having their access to social media taken away by the court. It's important to keep in

mind however, that the juvenile justice system is meant to rehabilitate youthful offenders, not punish them. In instances where we can help them get on the right track with rehabilitation, mental health services and restorative justice methods, that is our first choice.

In the last 16 months, our office received 43 school threats cases to review for formal charges, of which 10 cases have been filed in juvenile court. Our message is clear: every school threat is being fully investigated and every suspect will be held accountable.

Here are some of the factors the DA's Office and law enforcement consider, to confirm the credibility of a threat once the suspect has been identified:

- Investigate their background, including whether the person made prior threats
- Look at open-source intelligence such as social media posts
- Check to see if they have registered guns, have made recent ammunition purchases or have access to guns
- Check on whether there has been contact with terrorist organizations
- Determine whether they have had psychiatric holds or other mental health red flags

• Research whether the person has had a recent traumatic event or grievance with a particular school or person associated with a school

Even though we have a way to measure successful prosecution, it's not as easy to measure successful intervention, but preventing even one death or one school shooting is our duty. The best prevention for a school shooting is bystander intervention. We use public tips to investigate and interrupt violence. It's everyone's responsibility to report threats. You can also report anonymously at StudentsSpeakingOut. org.

As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public. I hope these consumer and public safety tips have been helpful.

Finding the place was a little challenging for some. When you get to Navel Place on the left you see a bunch of driveways and you wonder where the heck is this place? But if you look closely, there is a post with the address. Carlos also spoke of the different variety of orchids they breed and their very exotic unpronounceable names — such as cattleya, and castasetnae, and gave us tips on how to grow an orchid, watering, repotting, and other information.

He allowed time for questions and answers. Sima Kashani asked a lot of useful questions — I think she probably has a lot of orchids. Since they are breeders and also sell internationally, most of the plants are small—in the process of growing to blossom. However, we did see quite a few had bloomed and were absolutely beautiful, and with a wonderful fragrance. I even saw a black orchid for the first time and there was one called lady's slippers, which was beautiful.

One of the ladies in our group bought one that grows on the bark of a tree. That should be a good conversation piece! Carlos had a surprise for us - a greenhouse where the humidity was similar to New York in August. Some ladies left – it was stifling. The plants there need and thrive in this very high humid environment. There was a light mist to keep the high humidity at a certain level. As we walked to the humid area I spotted a papaya tree, I've never seen one and also saw the biggest poinsettia tree ever with large red poinsettias.

I asked Carlos if he knew how many plants they have on the premises – he said approximately 40,000. Wow! There are large areas where orchid lovers rent to keep their orchids. I find that peculiar because getting a plant and seeing it grow from babyhood to teens and then to blossom at home is very exciting. But it could be that certain orchids need a certain environment. Who knows? I should have asked.

So, if you ever want to see beautiful and different species of orchids, Sunset Valley Orchids would be a good place to go. They are on the internet, so look them up.

I want to thank all who came to the event (15 of us) and to Carlos for his generosity in sharing his knowledge and for the nice tour. Until next time. Adieu...

The Totally 80s Band started at 6pm and rocked the night away. From Human League to Flock of Seagulls to Billy Idol, this 6-piece band (male and


