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BOOK REVIEW - By Lynn Clark

"Horse" by Geraldine Brooks - historical fiction

Such a simple title for a book that tells a story of one of the greatest thoroughbreds in horse racing history. The horse's name was Lexington.

The novel is set in America during the historic time period prior to the Civil War when horse racing started to become a sport. It was a business fueled by wealthy land owners and anchored by the trainers, riders, and groomers of the enslaved black people in the South. Even though the story starts in 1850, the plot switches back and forth between two time periods emphasizing to the reader that some of the same issues that were evident in 1850 are still relevant today. This story is so well done it will capture your imagination from the beginning.

Date: 2019

The story starts in 2019 when Theo, a Nigerian American art historian, and a woman named Jess meet in Washington DC. He is writing an article about an artist named Traylor in advance of his art show in the American Art Museum. She is Australian and is working temporarily in the Smithsonian. Her expertise is working with bones and forming skeletons. She is offered a permanent position as the manager of their vertebrate Osteology Prep Lab. One of her first jobs is to find the skeleton of a horse that is supposed to be stored there.

What draws them together is a painting Theo finds in a pile of discarded belongings a neighbor has piled on a curb marked "free". The painting features a horse, but the picture is in terrible shape and Theo hopes it can be cleaned up at the museum and possibly have the horse and the painter identified.

Thomas J. Scott is a painter. He makes his living by travelling to different horse ranches painting the horses. He is on his way to the Meadows owned by a Dr. Warfield in Lexington, Kentucky. There he will meet a young slave called Jarret who will prepare and groom the horse selected to be painted.

Warfield's Jarret

Jarret is the main character in this book. When the painter first meets him he is a young lad that grooms the horses. His father, Harry Lewis, is a free man and is the breeder and horse trainer at the ranch. Harry's first wife and Jarret's mother died several years ago, but now Harry has a new wife and she is also free. Unfortunately, Harry only had enough money to purchase his new wife.. Jarret is still Dr. Warfield's slave.

Jarret has a special affinity with horses. His father is teaching him everything he knows about horses, and he quickly moves from groomer to chief horse breaker. When the colt Darley is born, an aging Dr. Warfield gives the horse to Harry as his wages for the year. It is a verbal agreement and is never put on paper. Jarret and Darley immediately bond and Jarret becomes his trainer. The horse is a superior specimen, and as his prowess on the track becomes evident he eventually draws the attention of unscrupulous people.

The 25 year historical journey of the enslaved trainer and the legendary horse renamed Lexington is a story you will not forget.

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Mental health on our mind

Mental Health has increasingly become part of the conversation as CO-VID lockdowns brought about isolation and loneliness affecting seniors, adults, teens, and children. In the wake of the pandemic the stress of rising inflation has added to depression and hopelessness. It has thrown more people into homelessness worsening mental and emotional disturbances which feeds into the stigma associated with mental illness.

Interfaith Community Services is hoping to alter perceptions about mental health with "Change Your Mind", a Free Inaugural Mental Health Festival from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., September 10, at the Viasat campus, 2456 Town Garden Rd., Carlsbad.

According to Mental Health America one in five adults suffer from mental illness and about 10% of youth have severe depression affecting thinking, mood, and behavior. Biological factors and traumatic life experiences including a history of abuse are all factors that contribute to mental health problems.

Seeing the ever-increasing need, Interfaith decided to take the lead by "Changing the Mental Health Conversation One Mind, One Life at a Time" and educating the community wanting to help but not knowing how.

"With the homeless there are so many mental health components like issues of belonging and trying to find a path out," said Interfaith's Chief Development Officer, Varinda Singh Missett. "We have been needing something like this, so we decided to take the lead and educate the community. Unless you are in dire straits, there isn't a lot of ways that the average per-

son can help the family or that person living on the bench."

According to Singh Missett there are many people who are on the brink, feeling lonely and isolated. The goal is to reach these people before they fall into a serious preventable crisis. She wants to reassure them that there is help and connection.

The festival is both a fundraiser and a dynamic event that aims to make information accessible to teachers, families, students, people in crisis or at risk and anyone involved or interested in a way that is non-threatening and even fun

Seven breakout sessions every half hour starting at 11:30 a.m. will cover a range of topics dealing with the power of belonging, neurodiversity gifts, creating a life-flight plan, mindfulness for Veterans, wellness and spirituality, depression in youth and teens, family communication, destigmatizing mental health and more. There will also be mental health panels offered in Spanish.

Attendees may choose to relax in the "De-stress Zone" in a cloud room or with aromatherapy, yoga, qigong, meditation, sound baths, animal therapy, or hands on art therapy with a live mural experience with local artists or with Kintsugi.

Kintsugi is a Japanese art form that consists of repairing broken pottery by mending the broken parts with lacquer that is dusted or mixed with powdered gold, silver, or platinum. The idea is to treat breakage and mending as part of the history of an object, rather than something to disguise or even discard. A thought-provoking metaphor.

Restoring California's failing mental health programs

California's mental health system is struggling to keep up with demand. Those seriously in need of treatment are trapped in a rotating cycle that takes them from living on the street, to the emergency room, sometimes to jail, then back to the street. Since more serious cases get the most attention, people with milder symptoms don't receive needed care and often fall into the same cycle.

Today, only about a third of Californians with mental illness receive the care they need, and 31 of California's 58 counties with a "high need" for mental health services report a shortage of mental health caregivers. That must change quickly if we are to get a handle on this serious public health/safety problem.

That's why I joined Senator Scott Wiener as co-author of Senate Bill 964. Sponsored by the Steinberg Institute, the bill will create a "Behavioral Health Workforce Preservation and Restoration Fund." SB 964 develops new coursework in our colleges and

universities that focuses on behavioral health, creates an online job board where licensed providers can post job openings, eliminates bureaucratic barriers that prevent trained workers from entering the field, and requires a comprehensive analysis of California's behavioral health workforce so we can meet the state's growing needs.

The bill also provides hiring and performance-based bonuses for workers and a stipend program for students in Master of Social Work programs with special focus on public behavioral health.

Implementation of SB 964 will revitalize and expand California's behavioral health workforce, and increase access to care for thousands of untreated or under-treated Californians dealing with serious mental illness and substance abuse problems. Ultimately, better care for the mentally ill will not only restore thousands of lives, it will lead to less homeless, less crime, and better, safer communities for all Californians.

Interfaith Community Services' mission is to empower those in need by providing life changing assistance through a comprehensive network of more than 75 programs and services. This festival is yet another proactive response to a need for further education and a better understanding of mental health and its effects on well-being

"Mental Health is on everybody's mind," said Singh Missett. "The mental health systems are overwhelmed, and we are equipped to do this. We have a lot of partners wanting to help."

The partners include Community Healthcare, the Neighborhood Health Group, Aetna, Molina Healthcare, Palomar Health Medical Group and Truecare

It is the hope of Interfaith that this event will give leaders of the community, organizations, and businesses an opportunity to promote and spread a greater understanding of how proper care and attention can affect a person's well-being and strengthen ties in the community. An emphasis will be on the important role that each individual and organization can play in encouraging and upholding a positive environment in which favorable mental health can thrive and how programs and/or services can establish a foundation where everyone's well-being can flourish.


